Lewis students learning with technology in the classroom

Fourth and fifth grade classrooms currently have one iPad checked out to each student, therefore called one-to-one classrooms. Our third grade students will soon have classroom sets of iPads as well. First and second grade classes have sets of iPads to share that they check out from the library and we are working on obtaining a small set for use in kindergarten center time.

There are a myriad of ways that students are using the devices to enhance their learning each day, but here are just a few:

Students are using kidblog.org to share their writing with each other and an online audience. Sharing with a real audience encourages students to communicate clearly and effectively that their readers will easily under-

stand. Ask your child to "invite" you to follow the class.


Another opportunity students have is the ability to quickly search for, read and view, a variety of sources on a topic. They can collect information by watching a video, reading short articles, looking at pictures or posts about the topic and even e-mailing an expert through a website. Imagine the difference between this and what WE did as students: go to the library, search key words, read an encyclopedia, maybe check out some library books or magazines! Seriously, how did we ever learn anything? The process took so long just to look up information!

Apps like iMovie and Keynote are being used by students to create short videos or presentations to show others what they have



learned. They can interview each other and record ideas. This gives the students practice in speaking clearly and effectively for others to understand. Children are learning how to cooperate and work together to create projects together, an important skill for their future. They get to show off their creative ideas and bring a bit of their own personality to the learning environment. Sure beats completing a worksheet over famous Missourians!

Overall, 90.41% of students have been present for 90% of school days this year so far. This is good. We are meeting our goal, but we need to stay vigilant! We can even do better! Making sure that students are at school every day unless they have a fever, are throwing up, or are contagious in some way will really help us out. dents to school on time every day--just like we need to get to work on time, students need to be on time to school. Below is the breakdown for each grade level showing the percentage of students who have a good attendance rate. Missing even 1-2 days per month, puts a student at risk of falling behind their peers in achievement.

Let's get that percentage up to 95%! Do it for our students' future success!

Citizenship is about being an informed, responsible, and caring participant in your community. It means doing your share to make your school and community better. Good citizens cooperate and get involved in community affairs. Citizenship is obeying laws and rules. Responsible citizens do things like volunteering and protecting the environment. Good citizens make good neighbors.

Demonstrating good citizenship is being a person who is involved in trying to make the community, nation, or world a better place. Good citizens are people who are engaged in, whether in big or small ways, considering the needs of others in their community. Good citizenship in practice is understanding, appreciating, and doing things that make life better for you and for others.

Throughout the month, teachers read books about characters who demonstrate citizenship and help students to recognize ways they can show they are good citizens at school and at home.



Students enjoy more reading options with myOn Digital Library

While I will ALWAYS promote reading actual books in which you can turn real pages, smell the ink, hold it between you and a child on your lap, and put a special bookmark in to hold your place, sometimes children want variety, and a digital library can provide another venue for reading some of the time.

Students in Excelsior Springs elementary schools have a digital library to access a huge variety of books that are right on their level and on topics of interest this year. With over 10,000 titles, the students can find fiction and nonfiction choices that are at a good practice level for each child.

Periodically, the student takes a short comprehension quiz to see if they are ready to move up a level. Reading silently and listening to the books can help boost a child's vocabulary-an extremely important skill for reading success. It is very important for students to also read a wide variety of books. This builds their background knowledge on many topics and introduces new vocabulary and language patterns. This will help them as readers in middle and high school when reading a variety of textbooks and content area reading for all the different classes they will take.

At last check, Lewis students have read more than 1,350 hours in the digital library.

Parents can track their child's reading patterns by having the student log in and check the reading history. Check for the number of books they have read, the amount of time they spend on each book and the levels of each. The library can be found at www. myon.com with each child's username and password. Your child probably knows their login, but you can always contact the teacher and they can easily look it up for you.

COUNSELOR'S CORNER:

How much sleep should our kids get?

Sleep is so important for kids' bodies and brains to re-coop, rest and reset. Something to keep in mind when wanting our kids to do their best each day.

Here are some benefits of getting enough sleep:

 Melatonin, a natural hormone, released in your brain while sleeping has many health benefits.
 Melatonin helps flood the body with healthy antioxidants which help boost the immune system and fight against toxins in the body.

 Heart rate decreases which lowers one's blood pressure and helps with heart function and blood flow. During rest, adrenaline and cortisol (your fight or flight responses or stress) decrease. Human growth hormones are released which are needed for muscle and bone growth and maintenance.

 Your immune system works overtime while one is sleeping. More proteins and white blood cells are fighting off germs, infections and disease.

This chart lists how much sleep our kids should get each night. Most elementary aged students will fall into the range of requiring 10-11 hours of sleep each night.

So if your child has to be

up by 7 a.m. each morning, then a bedtime between 8-9 p.m. would give them the recommended amount of sleep.
