Keep Christmas treasures safe, keep them home.

Here's a big reminder as we start back to school: Toys and games should **NOT** be brought to school unless the teacher requests. This goes for all year, but this time after Christmas is especially a temptation for children.

We know they are excited about new toys, etc. but it can really be a distraction to learning and can create issues when multiple children are vying for turns or don't understand the share rules of someone's personal toy.

We cannot be responsible for lost or broken items, so it is best to keep all toys and games at home. If your child does happen to sneak one out of the house in the morning, they will be required to put it away for the school day to prevent loss, damage, or distraction.

Please help by explaining to your child why we have this rule.

A teacher will always communicate with a note or through the classroom weekly newsletter if there is a special PBS incentive "game day" planned. Even on those days, you should only send items if you are willing to take the damage risk.

We try to be very careful at school, but accidents do happen sometimes. We have plenty of games for these incentive days.

LET IT SNOW

Cold weather recess requires appropriate clothing, be prepared

As winter has finally arrived here in Missouri, this often becomes the season of many indoor recess days. Whenever the actual or wind chill temperature falls below 20 degrees, we stay inside. We also have to stay inside if our playground has too much snow and/or ice.

However, as parents, we know children **NEED** to have the opportunity to run and be loud, work their large muscles, and get fresh air! It's what keeps them healthy and able to learn throughout the rest of the school day. So, we try to get them outside as often as we can, but we try to make sure they are dressed appropriately.

PLEASE make sure your child brings a coat, gloves/mittens, and a hat/hood every day. Some will begin to not bring the items if they aren't used every day and then won't have them when the temperature goes up and we have



the chance to go out.

We care very much for your child's well-being, and will err on the side of caution in making sure they are weather protected. We don't want to exclude children from playing outside with their friends, nor can we monitor an indoor AND an

outdoor recess each day.

PLEASE explain to your child the benefits of outdoor play/recess and work with them to help them remember and take care of their winter clothing. No one wants to keep replacing "lost" mittens or hats!

Reinforcing respect is focus for Jan.

Our character trait focus for January is RESPECT. We review the school wide expectations for showing respect in all settings daily. We give examples of what respect looks like and sounds like and how to show it to all



living things and property.

You can follow up at home with conversations! Model and describe for your child how you show respect in your daily life. Make a habit of saying "please" and "thank you". Talk about making eye contact with others and appropriate responses when an adult or another child addresses your child. Point out ways we show respect for property — our own, or other people's — by taking care not to damage or lose things.
